#### Dear colleagues:

One of the reasons I decided to accept the position of provost here at Texas A&M-San Antonio was because of the quality of the faculty, which, prior to my initial interview, I gauged based solely on publications. Once I arrived here, I also realized that the quality shows in every aspect of what goes on here, from classroom instruction, to service and outreach, and, of course to research. I cannot imagine any institution of higher learning that doesn't emphasize research because it's as much a part of educating undergraduate and graduate students as is lecturing to a class of thirty or holding a seminar discussion.

President Matson recently sent me a link to an article in the Washington Post that carried a professor's tips to parents who are helping their sons and daughters decide where to go to college. He had great advice: ignore the rankings, enjoy the college tour (but be sure and verify everything that's told to you), and spend your time finding out who the professors are. Here's the way he put it: "Smart consumers scour course offerings, departmental websites, and the registrar's

homepage in order to answer one crucial question: Does this school consistently place its best paid and most valued scholars, i.e., tenure-line faculty and/or properly compensated non-tenure-line faculty, in front of undergraduates?" Great question because it gets at what I believe a great university does: Puts the best and brightest faculty members in the classrooms and labs and gets students involved with what the faculty members are doing. Professors who continually seek new knowledge through research are the most current in their fields of expertise and are able to assimilate and disseminate the latest information in theory and practice. That's what parents want—and students will come to want—and that's what we deliver.

We also all need to remember that every time someone reads an article or picks up a book that carries the Texas A&M-San Antonio name, our brand goes up. The publications listed on the following pages demonstrate we're doing an excellent job of growing our brand recognition. And, while, we're at it, let's not forget our colleagues in the arts—music, art, and (some day) theater. Their stock in trade is not necessarily limited to publications but also includes performances and exhibits. Let's be sure to applaud their efforts in bringing world-class recognition to our university. As an aside, I remember several years ago when, as dean of arts and science, I was hiring a female astronaut to be part of our physics department. She had a doctorate, and the faculty and I concurred that she should come in as a tenured professor, even though she didn't have as many publications as some others in the department. The full professors weren't too bothered by that, but the chair of the college promotion and tenure committee—someone who was a research rock star—was concerned over the fewer number until I asked him how many Shuttle trips he had made during his career—she had made four— and how many space walks he had taken—she had made two. He voted yes.

As a scientist who is still heavily involved in research and publication, I am proud to be both the provost of A&M–San Antonio as well as a faculty member. Great job, everybody.

Faculty at Texas A&M-San Antonio have many responsibilities including a primary focus on teaching. Faculty are also scholars who do research and incorporate their research into teaching and publishing in academic and professional journals and books. Additionally, they are involved in service to the university, community, and their academic disciplines. I am proud of their accomplishments as scholars and researchers and the excitement generated by their discovery, analysis, action, and application. The works of our faculty are found in a wide variety of refereed professional journals, books, and chapters in books. Whenever one of our faculty publishes a manuscript, the name of our university is highlighted and shines a little brighter. We are going to continue to shine as we become a destination university with a continuing recognition that "The world is our campus, starting on the south side!"
